However, through the dedication and efforts of a small number of individuals, lobbying of government ministers and the employing of consultants to evaluate and question the validity of Ecotricity's proposals, pressure has been brought to bear on Ecotricity by government, forcing a further round of public consultation that concludes on 31 January. The building of the a wind farm at East Heckington is the single most important thing that could influence and affect our lives here in South Kyme, not only next year, but for years to come. It is no secret that this page is opposed to the building of a wind farm at East Heckington, as it has the potential to devalue property prices, cause a noise nuisance to residents, affect wildlife, (particularly migrating birds) and destroy our beautiful fenland landscape. Ecotricity still believe that they can do as they wish and build this wind farm regardless of substantial local opposition, so 2017 will be the year when we all need to get behind HECKOFF and support them in any way we can to ensure that this scheme is buried once and for all.

Finally, we would like to say a special thank you to a local resident for his kind donation to this magazine.

## **SOUTH KYME PARISH COUNCIL**

I trust everyone in the village had a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and as the festivities come to a hopefully satisfying conclusion we can all now look forward with anticipation and hope to the new challenges that 2017 will bring, either be it personal or professional and tackle them head on. The New Year is already looking interesting from a parish council perspective. The Heck-Off campaign (opposition to the proposed Heckington Fen Wind Farm) is gaining momentum and traction both locally, at district and at parliamentary levels and thus far has forced a further round of Ecotricity consultations and with only just under 16 months to go before the original planning consent expires we are hopeful of getting the right result. I will keep you informed of progress. Furthermore, after detailed discussions we have determined that the possible requirement for a 'Neighbourhood Plan' was not viable for such a small village and that a more appropriate vehicle would be a Parish Plan. Whilst not carrying as much legal weight it will still articulate, capture and inform the needs and aspirations of the entire village up to District Council level. It will also act as the future foundation and guidance document for subsequent parish councils. To this end we will be briefing all attendees at the Village Meeting on 30 April 2017 with a view to establishing a working group to put this plan into action within a 12 month timeframe. Anyone who wishes to be involved please make it known at the meeting.

Furthermore, at the last parish council meeting it was resolved that we should start the application process with the district planning authority to get 'The Hume' public house declared an Asset of Community Value (ACV), details of which can be viewed on the CAMRA Website. Of interest, you may well be aware that council tax is effectively made up of 3 parts; that which goes to the County Council (about 71%), the District Council (16%) and Police/Crime Commissioner (13%). The Precept is that part of the Council Tax then forwarded from the District Council to the Parish, which for South Kyme is around £4800 per annum. You are all probably thinking as I am, with reducing services in every aspect of life, and more so in rural areas, what do we get for our money? and it is a fair question but one for the politicians or the Pub! However, the precept, set within boundaries dictated by government, is set by the parish council and is the only part of council tax which is invested directly into the local community and is hence real value for money and money spent in which you all have a voice. Having stagnated for many years next year will see a 10% increase which only amounts to a few pence per year for each household and you can be assured that it will be spent directly on the ground in South Kyme. We really needed a 20% increase to maintain pace with years of lag/inflation but felt that it would be better done incrementally over several years. The provision of a village play area is still very much on the agenda and despite not identifying a suitable plot of land we are now exploring other options in conjunction with the village hall committee. This aspiration will also be a part of the Parish Plan mentioned earlier.

On the events front The Armistice Day parade on Friday 11 November was a fitting tribute to remember those people that paid the ultimate sacrifice during periods of war, whilst the 'Beer and Carols' night at 'The Hume' was well attended and enjoyed by all with two thirds of 'The Ruffs' providing excellent accompaniment to

the ad-hoc choir! Similarly, the Salvation Army night, as usual was an excellent pre-cursor to get the Christmas spirit flowing. A final word of thanks to those that, despite a last minute supply chain problem, procured and installed the Village Hall tree and lights for free. Next year we will look at pre-ordering a 20 ft plus tree from a reputable supplier in the spring!

Unfortunately dog fouling, as usual, is a perennial problem that impacts us all and one or two unscrupulous and/or thoughtless individuals seem to think it is OK not to pick up after their dogs. It does matter and affects us all so please pick up after your dog. We still await permission to enforce a 'Dogs-On-Leads' area adjacent to the riverbank within the village - this is imminent. The Village Tidy Group (VTG) has once again excelled throughout 2016 and a big thank you to all who helped. However, there are still many more faces within the village that we would like to see help out, so come on down, even if it is only for the odd half day or two a year, we would love to see you. The next VTG is tentatively planned for the last Saturday in February meeting at 8.30 am at the rear of the village hall and retiring to the Hume at about 11.30 am.

### **SOUTH KYME VILLAGE DOG WARDEN**

I currently feel like I'm on a constant losing battle! Is it really that hard to scoop your dogs poop? If your answer is yes to this then you really shouldn't be a dog owner! The high street continues to be a problem area although it's pleasing to see that the the original problem area is now clear and the residents can walk out of their drive without standing in poop. It appears that it has either moved further down the street or someone else now thinks it's OK not to scoop the poop! NKDC have the power to act on information supplied either directly to myself or to them, so if you know who it is doing it, then please forward their details to either myself or NKDC. On a more positive note, the new poop bin over the wooden bridge is being used regularly. Just a little reminder, as it is smaller than the others, it gets fuller between council emptying times, so please don't leave bags on the floor beside it should you find it full. This is classed as littering and is also a fineable offence. If you find it full carry your bag to the next bin please. We're now approaching the cold and icy months, so be careful.

De-icing products such as road salt and grit are the biggest potential danger to your dog's paws. Not only do these products that are often spread along both roads and pavements provide a hard, abrasive and gritty surface to help to prevent slips and falls, but they also contain a chemical de-icing product that can lead to chemical burns on the skin if exposed to prolonged contact. Avoid walking your dog over gritted surfaces wherever possible, and if your dog has been into contact with gritted surfaces, wash and dry its paws off thoroughly after your walk.

The project has been developed as a one year project to focus on helping young people to discover and share information about Lincolnshire's role in 20<sup>th</sup> Century conflicts. Our pupils are getting involved by gathering historical information from interviewing elderly local residents. The project is working with groups of young people across the county to produce guided memorial walks and cycle routes, enhanced by the historical information gathered.
