EDITORIAL

As we get ready to finalise and print this issue of The Tower, much welcome sunshine is streaming in through the window. This time of year is full of expectancy for a good spring and a warm and sunny summer and hopefully we will have decent weather for the annual boat gathering on the Mayday weekend.

You will have had delivered with this issue a flyer advertising a public meeting about the proposed wind farm at East Heckington. Although planning was granted by the Department of Energy and Climate Change (DECC) back in 2013, Ecotricity have radically changed the original proposal and submitted revised planning which is certain to increase the problems associated with wind farms, such as noise and flicker. You may all be thinking that the radar issue will stop the turbines being erected, but that is not a certainty. We urge all of you to come to the meeting to learn more about the new plans for the wind farm and to support the new action group 'Heck Off' which is fighting to get the planning application reversed and for Ecotricity to withdraw from Heckington Fen altogether. Things have changed since the 2012 public enquiry and much more weight is now attached to local residents' views, and those views need to be made known to the DECC if we are to prevent the wind farm from going ahead. Make no mistake, if the wind farm is erected, not only will it be a blot on the landscape, but it will have an adverse effect on the quality of life for people living within 2 to 3 km of the site and will devalue property prices in South Kyme - complacency is not an option!

Another hot and very important topic on the go at the moment that will affect us all, is the coming referendum on Britain's membership of the European Union (EU). There will be many arguments put forward for and against our leaving the EU and no doubt we will be saturated with it by the media between now and June. Britain joined the 'Common Market' in 1973 and Harold Wilson had a referendum in 1975 for us to decide whether to stay in the EU or leave, depending upon whether he could renegotiate better terms for Britain within the EU - does this sound familiar? Here we are again, 40 years later still being promised a better deal by the EU - make no mistake, leopards do not change their spots, the EU will promise anything at times like this to keep Britain (a major source of funding for the Brussels 'Gravy Train') in the EU. If being in the EU is so wonderful, why is this country always trying to re-negotiate a better deal? Forget the fear factor about trade and jobs, business is business and trade will continue as before, because at the end of the day, it is money and profit that drives trade and as Napoleon said, Britain is a nation of shop keepers. As for security and defence, NATO is the umbrella that shields us, not the EU.

Don't be fooled by the political smooth talk and scare mongering over the coming weeks. Rest assured that what the EU has granted Mr Cameron now, it will retrieve with interest in the future - history has shown us that the bureaucracy in Brussels does not relinquish its grip on power and control for long.

SOUTH KYME PARISH COUNCIL

A relatively quiet festive season and mild winter; what happened to the 2 – 3 feet of snow I always remember as a child? We have nonetheless seen the parish council make progress in a number of areas. The formal objections put to the Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change against the Heckington Fen Wind Farm have not only elicited an optimistic response but have also garnered support from the Marsh Wind farm Action Group (MWAG), a prominent scientist, and re-ignited some opposition from NKDC (prompted by our hardworking district councillor Julia Harrison) We remain hopeful of a satisfactory outcome and that the government ‘localism act’ lives up to its promise of giving local people a real say in development issues. The provision of a new container and outside tap at the village hall for the tidy group are on track as is the refurbishment of the Main Notice board. The Dog Warden has completed her training and is now able to issue penalty notices for dog fouling offences.

As mentioned in the last parish council minutes, we are starting to explore the feasibility of adopting some form of a ‘Neighbourhood Plan’ and, to ignite the debate a very useful presentation was given by the NKDC development team. This whole issue will be explored more fully in the coming months. Having endorsed the proposal to scope the provision of Digital Inclusion, subject to identifying a requirement, the response to my request for information from households has been poor. That said, the possibility of setting up a Council Facebook account is being looked at, but what I really need to know is who in the village does NOT have access to the internet, or put another way – would a village hall internet cafe style set up provide real benefit to residents?. (North Kyme has free Wi-Fi in the village Hall).

The Cluster meeting of local villages went ahead as planned on 8 February, chaired by South Kyme on a rotational basis - the next meeting is in Billingham on 6 September). This proved an extremely useful forum to promote inclusivity across parish boundaries whilst identifying common themes and problems. Of note, is that the highways Budget is being cut significantly as is manpower and therefore service levels will drop, meaning only minor repairs will be conducted. Weed spraying will be reduced and grass cutting will probably be unsubsidised! This will undoubtedly have an impact on the village tidy group remit. Clay Bank will not undergo improvement apart from white lining. However, the river bank stabilisation work on the high street still remains programmed for August 2016.

On the police front, crime remains relatively low apart from a notable increase in hare coursing which the police have dealt with very successfully and over 30 vehicles have been impounded. A request for increased levels of mobile speed cameras was received favourably.

As we approach spring, the Village Tidy Group will, once again, reactivate. For those new to the village this group of willing volunteers who cut the grass verges, footpaths and clear litter from the village meet on the last Saturday of every month at 8.30am at the rear of the village hall. The work completes usually not later than 11.45am when they then retire to the Hume for a well earned drink (or 2) and lunch (kindly provided by Maeve and Vijay - providing you tell them by the previous Thursday). Volunteers are always welcome so come along whenever they can, even if infrequently, to help keep the village looking immaculate.

There was no council expenditure over £100 requiring approval at the January parish council meeting.

Finally, the next parish council meeting and public forum will commence at 7.30pm on 17 March in the village hall.

HEALTH & NUTRITION

Omega-3 Fatty Acids

The health benefits that are believed to be associated with Omega-3 fatty acid intake include: decreased inflammation, help for arthritis, and reduced symptoms of depression. Omega-3 may even boost health and intelligence of unborn babies, though the mercury in fish significantly decreases IQ. While often a recommended source of Omega-3, fish and fish-oil supplements may not be harmless due to the presence of dioxins, PCBs, mercury, and other industrial pollutants. These pollutants in fish may increase our risk of type-2 diabetes and cardiac death. Other animal products such as chicken are no longer a bountiful source of Omega-3 due to genetic manipulation. Omega-3 enriched eggs can be a source, but eggs contain cholesterol and arachidonic acid. Two plant-based sources of Omega-3 are flax seeds and algae-based DHA supplements, which are bio equivalent to fish oil but do not have the harmful industrial toxins.

Turmeric

The spice turmeric has long been used to fight inflammation and may be able to improve endothelial function. Consuming turmeric may also be able to help with multiple myeloma, osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, and treat and prevent Alzheimer's.

Turmeric may be capable of preventing and treating (possibly by reprogramming cancer cell death) certain types of cancer including colon cancer, pancreatic cancer, skin, mouth, vulva, and ulcerating breast cancer.

In some cases, as with oxalates in cinnamon, we do need to be aware of who shouldn't consume curcumin or turmeric such as those who are pregnant or susceptible to kidney stones.
