"LEST WE FORGET"



11 November 1918 signalled the end of The Great War between the Allies and Germany. Since 1921, the nation has come together to remember the sacrifices that hundreds of thousands of British and Commonwealth Service men and women made not just during the Great War, but World War II and all subsequent wars and conflicts including Iraq and Afghanistan.

We especially remember those young men from South Kyme killed in action (KIA) in The First World War, whose memorial is in the churchyard of South Kyme:

Private William H Thompson 6th Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment KIA Gallipoli 09/08/1915 aged 19

Sergeant John H Lingard 2nd Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment KIA Somme 01/07/1916

Private Percy Skelton 2nd Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment Died of wounds 06/11/1916 aged 21

Private? Edward Freeston 17th Battalion Sherwood Forresters Died 10/12/1916

Private John Edward Creasey 4th Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment Died of wounds 27/09/1917 aged 22

Private Edward Pridgeon Holmes 2/8th Worcestershire Regiment KIA 21/03/1918

Private William Bates 1/4th Battalion Kings Own Lancs Regiment KIA26/04/1918

Corporal Joseph Auden Munks 24th County of London Battallion (The Queens) KIA 18/09/1918

Private Abraham Wells Machine Gun Corps (Infantry) – 100th Battalion KIA05/10/1918

Mi' sen, I'll be stoking up th' fire from coil oil just down ginnel afor I start flaggin - gi;oer! - and then have a kip which ill put me in fine fettle. Now if you're all flummoxed don't worry so am I!as real Yorkshire folk say: Ear all, see all, say nowt. Eat all, sup all and Pay nowt. And if ever thou does owt for nowt - allus do it fer thee sen. As winter approaches the parish council continues to make steady progress and in the last issue I gave a comprehensive overview on highway matters and the opposition to the proposed wind farm at Heckington Fen. Little has changed, but I will update you as, and when, information is available. Of note, and after many requests to the water authority, the river levels are now being maintained at a depth which will help reduce bank erosion and allow both narrow boats to remain afloat. The Viking Link project (1400MW cable link between Denmark and the UK) is now in its last consultation period however the landfall site and converter station do not impact within the South Kyme curtilage – we are keeping a watching brief.

With over 50 youngsters below the age of 16 in the village, the parish council are determined to try and identify a suitable plot of land to eventually develop as a children's play area. This is not a small undertaking and we are exploring all avenues including writing to all local land owners seeking assistance in identifying any suitable possibilities. Once, and if, we can overcome this first hurdle then there is a plethora of expertise within the District/County Councils who can advise us on a range of issues including funding.

You will note that the dilapidated wooden bench at the junction of Low Road/Clay Bank has now been removed and it will hopefully be replaced by a more robust green oak version in due course. The Dog Warden continues to monitor her patch although it is depressing to report that there are still regular illegal occurrences of dog fouling. The second dog warden and increased fines should help as well as the Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO's) of which we are awaiting confirmation from the District Council (this will allow us to enforce areas requiring dogs to be on leads).

The Village Tidy Group, as usual, does an outstanding job in maintaining and presenting the village to a very picturesque standard. The last clean up of the year will be at the end of November, thereafter, and as promised, I will regularly publish dates for 2017. We still need more volunteers, so please if you can spare the time, come along and get involved in supporting YOUR community. Usually held on the last Saturday of the month the tidy group meets at 8.30 am outside the Village Hall and finishes before noon, thence retiring to socialise in the Hume.

Finally, to all our readers please come along and support all the events over the autumn/ run up to Christmas and have a very enjoyable but safe Christmas and New Year.

The next Parish Council meeting and public forum will commence at 7.30 pm on Thursday 24 November in the Village hall.

GOING BATTY IN SOUTH KYME

One Saturday night in late June, Annette Faulkner and two of her colleagues from Lincs Bat Group paid a visit to help us start surveying the river with our newly acquired bat detectors, courtesy of the Postcode Local Trust. There are 17 different breeding species of bats in Britain and you can find 11 of them in Lincolnshire. At that time there was a roost of over 10 common Pipistrelles under Low Road bridge by the Hume. They were quite spectacular to watch, but any hopes of seeing them catch thousands of insects night after night were soon thwarted as they decided to move on. Yes, many bats change their roosts on a regular basis. The roosting cycle of the commoner UK bat species is reasonably well understood: hibernation in winter, then move to an intermediate roost in spring. In the breeding season, the females move into maternity roosts and in most species the males use other sites. Once the young are flying in late summer, intermediate roosts become important again, with mating roosts used in some species, then it's back to hibernation sites.

We recorded a Soprano Pipistrelle at Manor Farm bridge. Soprano Pips were only established as a separate species in the 1990s. Their echolocation calls are at 55mhz compared to the common pips at 45mhz. But what we were after were Daubenton's bats, often known as water bats because they fly low over the water sometimes scooping insects off the surface. Many of Lincolnshire's drains and rivers are being surveyed to assess how prevalent they are and especially where they roost. They seem to like the undersides of bridges and modern concrete ones have just as many crevices as older bridges.

We detected one and possibly two males as they emerged from Bottom bridge at about 40 minutes after sunset - we were crouched underneath it at the time. Two females were detected west of the Low Road bridge which suggested there may be a maternity roost in the vicinity. Subsequent surveying led me to conclude this was in the willow tree near the foot of Steve Coy's garden, but by late August they had also moved on.

For just £3 pa the Lincs Bat Group is excellent value for money – not just for the information they can provide, but also some of the opportunities to get close to bats. I spent a very insightful Saturday morning in September helping survey bats boxes in Tattershall woods and was allowed to weigh, sex and measure numerous Pipistrelles including the third type of Pipistrelle – Nathusius' Pipistrelle. Their smell is quite different and quite pleasant! We also found a brown long eared bat and several noctule bats, Britain's largest bat. They were very vocal and needed well experienced people to handle them. Common Pips weigh just 4-7g whereas Noctules can weigh up to 40g.

We are looking forward to 2017 and seeing a complete cycle of activity. By the time you read this most bats will have mated - but the females will store the males's sperm until next spring. A pregnant female will carry her young for a gestation period of at least 40 days and give birth to just one baby called a pup. It will weigh about 25% of her weight and suckle milk like most mammals do. The mothers and pups stay in groups, separate from the males, and the other mothers help take care of the pup until it is old enough to care for itself.

Bats are more fascinating than I imagined and there is still a lot to discover about their behaviour and numbers. If you want to help with local surveys next year please contact me at julianpurvis2@gmail.com
