



EDITORIAL

It is a pleasure to walk along the river bank up to the church without the need of a machete. The pleasure of walking is somewhat spoiled however, by those lazy individuals who refuse to clean up after their dogs. For the zillionth time, take a bag with you and pick up the poo, you have already helped to pay for dog waste bins and their emptying, so why not use them? **People who are spotted and reported, WILL be fined!**

It would appear that the government's reduction in subsidies for onshore wind farms is good news with regards to the fight against proliferation of wind farms in our area. However, the Heckington Fen site has already been approved and a token amount of work has been done on site to secure the planning, and the right for development and could yet be built if Ecotricity can come up with a suitable radar mitigation scheme to satisfy the MOD/RAF. The failure to block this development must rest with our District Council, who recently failed to deny the developer the right to amend the original consent and thus allow them to start work on the site before the existing planning approval lapsed in 2017. Our so called elected 'representatives' do not in every instance work for the greater good of the community. Sometimes, the people that tread the corridors of the council offices at Sleaford, should be reminded that they are in fact public (that is all of us) servants and not autocrats.

DID YOU KNOW?

Roman warships were not rowed by slaves. In almost all 'swords and sandals' movies and novels, when a galley [a large ship propelled primarily by rowing] appears, we hear the clank of slaves' chains and the crack of the overseer's whip. Both are completely anachronistic: the Romans, like the Greeks, had an ideology that we call 'civic militarism'. It was believed that if you were a citizen you had a duty to fight for your state, and conversely if you fought you were entitled to political rights.

This excluded the use of slave rowers, or slave soldiers like those of medieval Islam. In the handful of exceptional times when slaves were admitted to the armed forces, they were either freed before enlistment, or promised manumission if they performed well in battle.

SOUTH KYME PARISH COUNCIL

Now settled after the May election, the parish council continues to work assiduously on your behalf to improve the quality of life within the village. Similarly, the relationship with the District Councillor continues to be nourished and is already proving constructive in a number of areas, not least in clarifying planning applications and the situation with the proposed Heckington Fen wind farm following the precedent set by the cancellation of the Nocton Fen development due to local opposition. This is ongoing and a resolution is far from clear at this time.

Volunteer Dog Warden: The position has yet to be filled but we may have a suitable candidate about to come forward. Dog fouling seems to be on the rise again – please ensure that you pick up your dog mess as it is a legal requirement to do so and punishable by a large fine if caught.

Highway matters: At a recent meeting with the Highways Manager, Mr Lennard, a number of improvements to the roads, bridges and pathways were instigated and will complete before March 2016. (Of note: There are only 2 teams of 2 workers to cover the whole of the Sleaford area so understanding and patience are key watch words!). The speed indicator device (SID), shared with North Kyme on a monthly basis, is helping to slow the majority of traffic, but I would like to see a more proactive and occasionally visible police radar presence to catch the speeders. We are in continual liaison to try and improve the situation.

Friday shopping bus: This has now ceased ,with Call Connect being the reversionary traditional method of transport. Although, on the surface it was not successful due to a poor uptake of passengers, the bus itself was the catalyst to highlight to the District Council, the local MP and Transport Minister the plight of rural transport problems suffered by small villages such as South Kyme.

Best Kept Village: No details have yet been received for this year, however we should still plan on judging to take place in September 2015 as normal.

Village Tidy Group: Please come along and enjoy the camaraderie (and work) at 8 30 a.m.on the final Saturday of every month. On completion we retire to the Hume for a few glasses of beer and to get to know each other.

Council spending over £100 approved at the July meeting was £522.00 to Chris Sellars Groundcare for a new Toro petrol hover mower.

Finally, please remember that this is your village and improvements can only be made with your help, support and input. To this end the next 15 minute Public Forum will be held at 7.30 p.m. on 10 September in the village hall, and which immediately precedes the Parish Council Meeting. As mentioned in my last input, it is hoped that some members of the Council will make some courtesy calls to introduce themselves and you may also find this a useful forum to provide any feedback you may have.
